#### Easter

Easter is the pinnacle of our faith. This is the birthday of our eternal hope. Jesus rose from the dead, just as he told his disciples he would do, even though they did not understand him then or even on the day they found the empty tomb. The Resurrection is the greatest of the miracles -- it proves that Jesus is God. It is the foundation that our faith is built upon. Without the Resurrection, our faith would be in vain, as St.

Paul wrote to the Corinthians.

But he did rise! And we celebrate this every year. We live and breathe with our liturgical calendar as Jesus is born, he ministers

among us for three years, he dies and is buried, and he rises on the third day in accordance with scripture. Alleluia!

Easter is the promise of our own resurrection. He told Martha at the tomb of Lazarus, "I am the Resurrection and the life; whoever believes in me will live even though he dies." By virtue of the Holy Spirit, our Christian life is already a participation in the death and Resurrection of Christ according to the Catechism of the Catholic Church.

There is so much pain and sorrow in the world, we need messages that tell us life is worth living. Easter is the giant billboard of that message. We believe in the real presence of Jesus Christ in Eucharist. His Resurrection made that possible. We trust in this message as we go about our daily lives. It gives us the strength to fight temptation.

We will now spend the next 50 days celebrating the season of Easter. As we listen to scripture, we know that the enormity of the resurrection dawned slowly for the followers of Christ. Mary Magdalen and the other Apostles thought that the body of Jesus had been stolen from the tomb. As Jesus walked on the road to Emmaus, he was with followers who did not recognize him at first. Jesus visited his Apostles in the locked room. What relief they must have felt after they got over the initial shock that Jesus was still with them and he had a plan for how he would always be with us. He gifted us the Holy Spirit.

I have felt a new optimism the last few weeks as the vaccine for the Corona Virus has become more available. It really feels like there is an end to this pandemic and life may come back to some sense of normalcy before long. I can't imagine a better reminder of a resurrection in our own lives. During the next 50

#### WHAT IS EASTER?

The Easter Vigil is the "Mother of All Vigils." Easter Sunday, then, is the greatest of all Sundays, and Easter Time is the most important of all liturgical times. Easter is the celebration of the Lord's resurrection from the dead, culminating in his Ascension to the Father and sending of the Holy Spirit upon the Church.

There are 50 days of Easter from the first Sunday to Pentecost. It is characterized, above all, by the joy of glorified life and the victory over death expressed most fully in the great resounding cry of the Christian: Alleluia! All faith flows from faith in the resurrection: "If Christ has not been raised, then empty is our preaching; empty, too, is your faith." (1 Cor 15:14)


"What you sow is not brought to life unless it dies. And what you sow is not the body that is to be, but a bare kernel of wheat, perhaps, or of some other kind;...So also is the resurrection of the dead. It is sown corruptible; it is raised incorruptible. It is sown dishonorable; it is raised glorious. It is sown weak; it is raised powerful. It is sown a natural body; it is raised a spiritual body. If there is a natural body, there is also a spiritual one. So, too, it is written, "The first man, Adam, became a living being," the last Adam a life-giving spirit. But the spiritual was not first; rather the natural and then the spiritual. The first man was from the earth, earthly; the second man, from heaven. As was the earthly one, so also are the earthly, and as is the heavenly one, so also are the heavenly. Just as we have borne the image of the earthly one, we shall also bear the image of the heavenly one (1 Cor 15:36-37, 42 -49).

The octave of Easter comprises the eight days which stretch from the first to the second Sunday of Easter. It is a way of prolonging the joy of the initial day. In a sense, every day of the Octave is like a little Sunday.

The word "Easter" comes from Old English, meaning simply the "East." The sun which rises in the East, bringing light, warmth, and hope, is a symbol for the Christian of the rising Christ, who is the true Light of the world.

The Paschal Candle is a central symbol of this divine light, which is Christ. It is kept near the ambo throughout Easter Time and lit for all liturgical celebrations.

#### WHO ARE THE CATECHUMENS?

First, the name of the Trinity—the Father the Son and the Holy Spirit—is invoked upon the catechumen. Thus, from the outset, a synthesis of the journey of faith is provided. The God who called Abraham and wished to be called his God, the God who revealed his name to Moses, the God who, in giving us his Son, revealed fully the mystery of his Name, now bestows upon the baptized a new filial identity." (Lumen Fidei, no. 42)

This Lent, you might have seen people preparing for baptism and initiation into the Church. These people, called Catechumens, are on a journey of spiritual growth. The Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults is the formal process that guides that journey, and during Lent, there are particular markers along that road.

On some of the Sundays of Lent, the catechumens were presented with the Lord's Prayer and the Creed. They were also asked to publicly give witness to their desire for full communion with the Church, through rites that have the somewhat intimidating name of "Scrutinies." These scrutinies usually happened at a Sunday mass, in front of the assembled congregation.

It may seem odd, but the catechumens are usually dismissed from the mass after the homily. Since they don't yet participate in the celebration of the Eucharist, they are dismissed to study the word of God and to continue their preparation for baptism and initiation.

In most places, the catechumens will be received into the Church during the Easter Vigil. Because they are becoming Catholic as adults, they generally receive all of the sacraments of initiation at once: they are baptized, confirmed, and receive their first Eucharist at the Easter Vigil.

Congratulations to our RCIA Elect on receiving their Sacraments at the Easter Vigil.

They have received all three Sacraments of Initiation and are now members of the Church and our family of St Louise de Marillac.

Please continue to keep them in prayer as they begin a new part of their journey of faith.

#### **FAQS ABOUT EASTER**

#### Why is Easter Celebrated?

Easter is the most important liturgical time for Catholics. It celebrates Jesus's victory of sin and death and salvation for mankind. It is God's greatest act of love to redeem mankind.

## How are the dates for Easter, Palm Sunday, and Ash Wednesday determined?

Easter is celebrated on the first Sunday after the Paschal full moon, which is the first full moon occurring either on or after the spring equinox (March 21). As a result, Easter will always fall between March 22 and April 25. To get the date for Palm Sunday, we go back one full week since it's the Sunday before Easter Sunday. To find the date for Ash Wednesday, we go back six weeks which leads to the First Sunday of Lent and four days before that is Ash Wednesday.

#### Are there specific Easter Prayers?

Yes, during each Mass during the Easter Octave (the eight days following Easter Sunday) the Alleluia is sung at the conclusion of each Mass. There are other specified Easter prayers for the Mass and liturgical celebrations that can be found in the Roman Missal.

#### Is Easter always celebrated on a Sunday?

Yes, Easter is always celebrated on a Sunday since Jesus rose from the dead on the first Sunday following the Jewish feast of Passover.

#### REJOICE AND BE GLAD

During the first three or four centuries of Christianity, if you asked a Christian to name the feast days of the church, your answer would have been a puzzled stare, for there was only one feast: the Resurrection of the Lord. Every Sunday was a feast celebrating the one great feast. Even though our calendar now has many beautiful and holy feasts, we must continually be called back to the fact that all these other feasts exist because of the feast of Christ's passover from death to life. The psalm today proclaims this message well: "This is the day." It is not one of many days, but it is the day of all days, the one that gives all the others their origin, purpose, meaning, and destiny. Listen carefully to Peter's speech in Acts with its recollection of the Passion, to the words of the apostle Paul, and to the account of Mary Magdalene, John, and Peter finding the empty tomb, and you will hear the many wonderful works that God has done for us through Christ. Rejoice and be glad!

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# SAINT MAGDALEN OF CANOSSA (1774-1835)

#### April 10th

This foundress, born to a noble family in Verona, Italy, lost her father at age 5 and was abandoned by her mother when she remarried. Choosing religious life over an advantageous marriage, Magdalen first joined the Carmelites, but left when she saw that their strict rules of enclosure would prohibit her charitable works. She began a new community, the Canossian Daughters of Charity, in 1799 by bringing two poor girls into her own home. The institute spread throughout Italy, and Magdalen helped found an order of priests and a third order for laypeople. Canossians minister today in Italy, Latin America and the Philippines. Magdalen, who was canonized in 1988, famously said, "Those who love are never tired, since love knows no

#### **FEAST OF FAITH**

#### The Eucharist: Food for Resurrection

How do we celebrate Easter, the greatest of our Christian feasts? By doing what we do every Sunday and every day: celebrating the Mass. On the first Easter, as the heartbroken disciples walked the road to Emmaus, the Lord was with them but they did not realize it. They only recognized him "in the breaking of the bread" (Luke 22:35).

It is the same for us. In the Mass—the breaking of the bread—we meet the risen Lord together. We meet him in each other—for by our baptism into his death and resurrection, we have become members of one body, the Body of Christ. We meet him in his word—in the liturgy the scriptures are proclaimed to us, that they might take root and grow in us. And we meet him in a special way in the Eucharist, the sacrament of his Body and Blood, which is food for resurrection: "whoever eats this bread will live forever" (John 6:51). 



# APRIL Is Child Abuse Prevention Month

Every April, Catholic parishes and schools across the United States participate in National Child Abuse Prevention Month.



# The Effects of ABUSE

When a child is abused, the effects are grave and can last a lifetime. Some of the most common effects of abuse include:

- Loss of faith and trust in God.
- Post-traumatic stress disorder, psychological distress, and other indirect signs of trauma, such as anxiety, trouble sleeping, chronic stomach pain, and headaches.
- A greater risk of developing behavioral problems, substance abuse, and suicide.

The sense of violation goes deep into a person's psyche and feelings of anger, shame, hurt, and betrayal can build long after the abuse has taken place.

# Steps to Prevent ABUSE

#### Communicate with Your Children

It is extremely important to communicate openly with your children. Let them know that they can talk to you about anything that bothers them. This will help you identify warning signs and grooming behaviors perpetrated by offenders before they escalate to abuse.

#### Educate Yourself and Your Children on Abuse

Learning how to identify, prevent, and report abuse is key. Parents and guardians should empower their children to protect themselves from harm and to report abuse. Ask your diocesan safe environment coordinator or parish delegate about opportunities for safe environment training.

# Identify and Report Warning Signs of Child Abusers

Grooming behaviors are the actions abusers take to project the image that they are kind, generous, caring people, while their intent is to lure a minor into an inappropriate relationship. Offenders can be patient and may groom their victim, his or her family, or community for years.

Some abusers isolate a potential victim by giving him or her undue attention or lavish gifts, while others allow young people to participate in activities which their parents or guardians would not approve, such as watching pornography, drinking alcohol, using drugs, and excessive touching, such as wrestling and tickling. Abusers also often try to isolate their victims from family or friends and encourage their victims to keep secrets from their parents or other caring adults.

# Holding Offenders ACCOUNTABLE

To help hold offenders accountable, report all suspected abuse to local public authorities. You can also contact your local diocesan victim assistance coordinator to make a report and seek outreach for the abused.

In accordance with diocesan policy, when a single act of sexual abuse is admitted or established, the offender is to be removed permanently from ministry.
